Conference Report Victor Sehn: HARC 2024

I had the opportunity of attending the Hawaii Accounting Research Conference in Honolulu from January 3rd to January 5th, 2024. As my first American conference experience, the event held high expectations, especially when comparing it to the European conferences I had previously attended.

After enduring more than 24 hours of flight and grappling with a significant case of jet lag, my conference journey began. The event kicked off with a traditional Hawaiian blessing, setting the tone for a unique and culturally rich experience. Their perspectives added depth to my research, and I left the conference with valuable insights, a refined publication strategy, and newfound motivation.

I explored the natural beauty of Kauai and Hawai'i, engaging in activities such as hiking along the famed Kalalau Trail on the eastern coast of Kauai. Lazy days on the beach provided a perfect balance to the intellectual stimulation of the conference.
