The objective of this seminar is to explore the history of macroeconomic thought pertaining to the post-war era, both from a long-run perspective and a short-run perspective.

For the long-run perspective we will cover the evolution of thought from the initial contributions by Solow to the modern variations of the neo-classical (endogenous) growth model and unified growth theory.

For the short-run perspective we will explore the progression from "spreadsheet" approaches to modern microfounded structures such as the DSGE model (including heterogeneous agents).

Note: the literature covered in this seminar is intentionally very broad and includes both theoretical and empirical contributions; specific topics of interest can be coordinated on in the preliminary meeting.
