




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LMU Erasmus Policy Statement - Abstract

LMU is convinced that the mobility of students and staff alike plays a major role in sustaining internationalisation. An explicit goal of LMU is thus to promote the development of tangible global and intercultural competencies by means of international experiences. The participation in all Actions of the Erasmus+ Programme ensures that not only international education is accessible to a growing number of students and staff and transnational cooperation is enhanced but also that awareness of the European identity is raised.

Since 1989 LMU has been actively involved in Erasmus activities and has amassed expertise in the management of mobility programmes such as KA 103, KA 107 and Erasmus Mundus. Participation in the Erasmus Programme is essential for achieving strategic goals in the closely interwoven fields of digitalisation, diversity and internationalisation at LMU. Also, participation in the European University project EUGLOH, where these topics are of primary importance, provides the perfect opportunity for LMU to experiment with new forms of mobility featured in the next Erasmus programme generation. By expanding its portfolio of digital teaching and learning platforms, LMU endeavors to develop new forms of mobility such as blended learning, flipped classroom and virtual laboratory experiences which in turn will make European learning and teaching experiences accessible to a greater number of students and staff including disadvantaged groups. In line with EWP, LMU will exchange Inter-institutional Agreements and Learning Agreements digitally. LMU is also planning the implementation of the European Student Card. Diversity, inclusion and internationalisation form the guiding principles of LMU governance and play an important role in all processes at the University. LMU is equipped to embrace the challenges and opportunities of the next Erasmus era and to further develop an environment of exceptional European transnational learning and teaching.

The Abstract was part of the LMU application to obtain the Erasmus Charta for Higher Education, delivered in May 2020. The Erasmus Charta was awarded to LMU Munich in December 2020.

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
