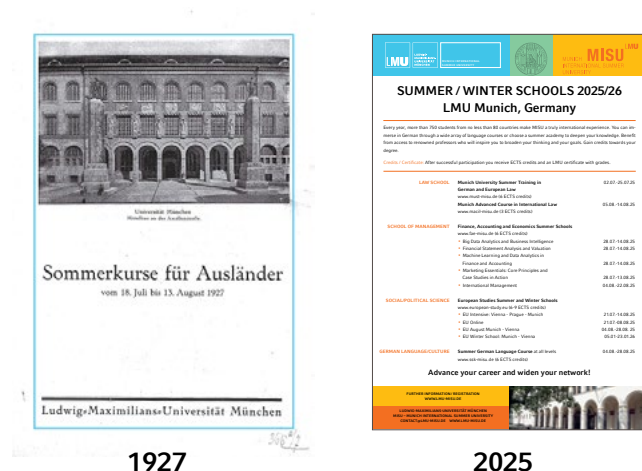

MISU^{LMU} at a GLANCE

History

During the 1920s and 1930s, LMU Munich hosted summer courses pertaining to German language and literature. The first course to be documented was a German language class in the summer of 1927. After a hiatus lasting several decades, LMU Munich restarted its summer activities in 1998, then under the name of „Internationaler Münchner Sommer“. Subsequently, the number of language classes has grown, along with the establishment of genuinely new Summer Academies covering a broad range of academic subjects. In 2008, LMU's summer courses were integrated into the Munich International Summer University, or MISU^{LMU}, giving a distinct vision and common standards to the various programs as well as consolidating its role as an international institution of LMU Munich.



Concept and Key Features

Summer programs are valued as an instrument for improving the profile of a university and a chance to showcase its academic strengths to an international cohort of students and their home universities. As an institution of LMU Munich, MISU^{LMU} curricula are developed and classes held by LMU staff, partly in cooperation with outstanding German and international partners. All courses guarantee a high academic standard. Small classes, as well as modern and interactive teaching methods, ensure that students are fully engaged in their studies. In general, it is possible to earn credits (usually ECTS credit points in accordance with the European Credit Transfer System) for MISU^{LMU} Summer Academies and Language Courses. The programs are academically intensive but offer far more than an academic experience alone, as the participants also learn a great deal

about their host city and country during their stay. In addition, the students are supported by a broad spectrum of services, such as detailed prearrival information and the organization of their accommodation. All MISU^{LMU} courses and activities are of a non-profit nature: the fees for participants are calculated to cover the costs only. And, of course, MISU^{LMU} strives to offer financial aid for students from partner universities, too, in order to facilitate participation.

Objectives

MISU^{LMU} aims at providing its participants with high-level academic knowledge as well as an unforgettable stay in Munich, while simultaneously enhancing the international visibility of LMU Munich and its academic strengths. Summer programs are also valued as a means of developing international cooperation with partner institutions. For international students, MISU^{LMU} offers an excellent opportunity to gain insight into research and teaching at LMU. Courses can serve both as an alternative to longer exchange programs as well as a pathway to further studies, thus increasing student mobility and attracting students of extraordinary caliber. Furthermore, MISU^{LMU} is designed as a long-term undertaking, with a spectrum of courses representing the relevant academic subjects of LMU Munich. Hence to increase the number of Summer Academies is another important objective for the future.

Responsibilities

The MISU^{LMU} Academic Board, which merged with the Study Abroad and International Students Advisory Board, functions as an advisory panel and is responsible for both quality control and quality assurance. All faculties are members of the board: the Vice President for International Affairs, who acts as chair; professors, each of whom represents a different discipline; foreign representatives of the faculties, who advise on academic matters; the head of the International Office, and the executive director of the IUCM, who advise the board on administrative and non-academic concerns.

Different parties shoulder MISU^{LMU}'s practical organization. The International University Club Munich (IUCM) is responsible for logistics, communication, administrative matters, and the centralized preparation of the certificates. Academic staff members of LMU Munich prepare schedules and select participants, along with holding classes, testing, and grading.

Organization

The International University Club Munich (IUCM) is a „Verein (e.V.)“, a registered non-profit association of former LMU students. In 1998 it restarted the tradition of summer schools at LMU Munich from 1927 under the name ‚International Summer Munich‘. The ISU lasted until the summer of 2007, when the Munich International Summer University (MISU^{LMU}) was established as a successor organization. Since then the MISU^{LMU} has been coordinating existing summer programs, cooperating in developing new ones, and promoting communication about MISU^{LMU} within the LMU, to LMU partners, and to interested people around the world.

The IUCM is responsible for the administration and continuity of MISU^{LMU} in close partnership with LMU's International Office. Their shared goal is to enhance the internationality of LMU Munich by assisting international students. The cooperation between LMU Munich and the IUCM is laid down in an agreement, through which IUCM assumes responsibility for MISU^{LMU}'s organization. IUCM's activities include the management of all financial issues, MISU waivers, accommodation – usually in student residences – excursions, and the social and cultural program, plus the handling of the application process for several courses.

Network and Communication

The MISU^{LMU} office networks both within LMU and externally. Intra-University communication involves the administration – most notably the University Executive Board – on the one hand, and members of the academic staff, on the other.

In the light of the fact that the internet is essentially the main source of information worldwide, the maintenance and regular updates of the MISU^{LMU} sites is a main concern of all involved parties. The summer courses portal of the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD), the portal of the Bavarian State Ministry of Sciences and the Arts and other summer school databases are also instrumental in informing young people around the globe, complemented by flyers and posters for MISU^{LMU}. Platforms which report regularly on MISU^{LMU} include: the newsletter of the International Office and LMU's international newsletter (insightLMU).

Relevant points of intersection are the strategic partnerships and international networks of LMU, as well as the colleagues at International Offices of LMU partner universities worldwide. This is often just as true of people encountered at visits, fairs, and other events, and delegations visiting the International Office of LMU Munich.

MISU^{LMU} Summer Academies offer high-level instruction in various scientific subject areas of LMU Munich – opportunities range from demanding undergraduate courses via advanced seminars to practical research experience held in English. They are an excellent opportunity for international students to gain a valuable first insight into researching and teaching at LMU. MISU^{LMU} always strives to enhance the number and to broaden the spectrum of subjects of its Summer Academies.

In 2025 a total of 16 programs were organized in various academic fields. Some of the programs were conceptualized partly as online and partly as on-campus courses.

Focus 2025: The European Union: Challenges, Crises, and Solution Approaches

The European Studies Summer and Winter Schools at MISU^{LMU} offer introductory lectures on the European Union and are implemented in different formats. All programs are coordinated by the Geschwister-Scholl-Institute of Political Science and the Chair of Political Systems and European Integration and held in cooperation with the Central European University in Vienna.

The European Studies Winter School takes place in January and is therefore especially orientated towards students from the southern hemisphere, and others. Participants have the opportunity to explore two vibrant European cities - Munich and Vienna - first-hand while getting an academic introduction into the politics and policy-making processes of the European Union. As part of the program, an optional German Class for beginners is offered for those students who are interested in making first steps into learning the German language.

Extracurricular activities like a guided city tour and a weekend tobogganing trip to the Alpine Mountains give the participants the chance to experience the Bavarian winter and to connect outside the classroom.

Future prospects: The program will continue in 2026.

Focus 2025: The European Union: Challenges, Crises, and Solution Approaches

The European Studies Summer and Winter Schools at MISU^{LMU} offer introductory lectures on the European Union and are implemented in different formats. All programs are coordinated by the Geschwister-Scholl-Institute of Political Science and the Chair of Political Systems and European Integration and held in cooperation with the Central European University in Vienna.

The Summer Schools in July and August do not only take place in Munich and Vienna, but also invite participants to the city of Prague where classes take place at the Representative Office of the State of Bavaria in the Czech Republic. There are two different variants of the program: The EU Intensive course is designed for students with a solid background in Political Science who would like to deepen their knowledge of the EU with the course. The participants of the European Studies and German Class start the program with their fellows in Vienna and Prague, but continue with the four-week Summer German Language Course once they are on Munich to improve their German skills.

Extracurricular activities like guided city tours and a weekend trip to the famous castle Neuschwanstein give the participants the chance to experience more of Europe's culture and history and to connect outside the classroom.

Future prospects: Both programs will continue in 2026.

Oncology Winter School since 2013

Klinikum der Universität München



In the course of this four-week program, medical students from around the world get a close-up view of the everyday routines in an oncology clinic.

Topics and objectives: Participants spend the first part of the day on the oncology wards, learning the daily routines, accompanying patients from reception through diagnostic procedures to therapy sessions. The afternoons are taken up with courses on the latest diagnostic methods or therapeutic approaches, and discussion of individual case studies in small groups. In addition, they work with actors on aspects of problem-oriented communication, a vital element of the medical professional's skill set. As well as getting to know the day-to-day routines on the wards, the students are introduced to clinical laboratory work and try their hand at image-based functional diagnostics. The program is topped off with excursions during the weekend with, for example, a guided city tour or a visit to Castle Neuschwanstein.

Target group and application: The elective addresses senior medical students, particularly those from LMU Partner Universities, who attend this four-week rotation together with senior medical students from LMU. A German „study buddy“ is assigned to each participant from abroad.

Future prospects: The program will continue in 2026.

Neurology Winter School since 2013

Klinikum der Universität München



The Neurology Winter School consist of a series of lectures, tutorials, seminars, bedside teachings, communication training and lab visits with a particular focus on Neurology.

Topics and objectives:

- Principles of neurology and neural science
- Intersections with neurosurgery, neuroradiology and psychiatry
- Methods of diagnosis and treatment

The international students choose a field of interest for patient contact and rounds and integrate into the medical team during the whole Winter School. They attended the daily neurological review conducted by the staff specialists at the Medical Center, hospitalize patients and discuss the anamnesis of physical examination and test results as well as the adequate treatment with their respective ward doctors or consultants.

Furthermore, specific tutorials instruct the students how to discuss clinical cases in a problem-oriented and cooperative manner. Small group training sessions and seminars involve diagnostic tools in neurology, interpersonal communication, e.g. "Breaking Bad News", simulations based on standardized patients and other elements of the medical professional's skill set. The program is topped off with excursions during the weekend with, for example, a guided city tour or a visit to Castle Neuschwanstein.

The Neurology Winter School also features an excursion to the Schön Klinik Bad Aibling, one of the largest and most renowned neurological rehabilitation centres in Europe for stroke and craniocerebral injury.

Target group and application: The elective addresses senior medical students, particularly those from LMU Partner Universities, who attend this four-week rotation together with senior medical students from LMU. A German „study buddy“ is assigned to each participant from abroad.

Future prospects: The program will continue in 2026.

Winter School Methods in Digital Heritage since 2024

LMU Munich, Digital Cultural Heritage Studies

The 1st Munich Winter School Methods in Digital Heritage brought together an international cohort of students eager to explore the latest techniques in cultural heritage digitization. This year's focused on museum collections digitization and dissemination methods, equipping participants with essential skills in photogrammetry, laser scanning, and digital preservation.

Throughout the program, students engaged with the 'Digital Turn' in cultural heritage, analyzing its historical significance and contemporary applications in museum and site management. The first week focused on digital photogrammetry, teaching students the fundamentals of image acquisition, processing, and visualization. The second week introduced laser scanning technologies, guiding participants through the workflows of site and object documentation. Practical sessions took place at two of Munich's renowned museums — the Staatliches Museum Ägyptischer Kunst (SMÄK) and the Museum für Abgüsse Klassischer Bildwerke — where students gained hands-on experience in data acquisition. In addition to museum visits, the Winter School offered lab-based sessions where participants developed small research projects, applying the skills they acquired throughout the course. The program concluded with a showcase of their work at the IDCHS VR Lab, providing an opportunity for feedback and discussion with faculty and peers.

The Munich Winter School Methods in Digital Heritage was made possible by funding from LMU's Study Program Development Fund (LMUexcellent) and support by the Faculty for the Study of Cultures. This made possible the participation of students from many different countries, who would in many cases not have been able to fund their participation themselves.

Target group: Undergraduate students in their second or third year in a heritage-related discipline who have a deep interest in heritage and digital techniques.

Future prospects: With the ongoing funding from LMU's Study Program Development Fund, the program is going to continue in March 2026.

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Summer Research “From Molecules to Behavior” (Amgen Scholars) since 2009



Munich Center for Neurosciences – Brain and Mind (MCN), LMU Munich

Together with the University of Cambridge, the Karolinska Institutet in Stockholm, ETH Zurich and Institut Pasteur in Paris, LMU Munich was selected as a partner with the Amgen Foundation in order to establish an undergraduate summer research program in the fields of biology and biotechnology. Under the guidance of MCN LMU, the Summer Academy “From Molecules to Behaviour” has been running now since 2009. Further participating institutes are: the LMU and LMU Klinikum, the Helmholtz Zentrum München, the Max-Planck Institutes of Biochemistry, Biological Intelligence, and Psychiatry, and the Technical University of Munich. In 2025, 11 projects were offered in the research fields of biochemistry, cell, developmental, and molecular biology, genetics, microbiology, molecular medicine, cellular and organism neurobiology, computational neuroscience, cancer research, plant sciences and proteomics.

Topics and objectives: The program aims to increase learning and networking opportunities for undergraduate students committed to pursuing a career in science or engineering.

Target group and application: Qualified students are selected based upon overall academic success, qualified references, motivation to pursue research, and a sincere interest in pursuing a PhD and a career in science. Due to the requirements of the foundation, only undergraduate students enrolled at European colleges and universities (according to the European Higher Education Area - EHEA) are eligible to participate.

Certificates: A certificate and transcript of activities is awarded by the program coordination office at LMU.

Future prospects: The first proposal was approved by the Amgen Foundation for 2009 and 2010, which was followed by successful 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th phase proposals continuing the program through 2027.

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MCQST Summer Bachelor Program Since 2021

Munich Center for Quantum Science and Technology



Every year, MCQST invites 15-20 outstanding undergraduate students from all over the world to spend a quantum summer in Munich. The 4-week program gives the participants the opportunity to deepen their theoretical and practical knowledge in Quantum Science and Technology (QST) and learn about the Munich quantum ecosystem. The special feature of the program is the three-week research project that the participants carry out under the guidance of a mentor in an MCQST research group. By the end of the program, participants have gained first-hand expert knowledge in QST.

MCQST focuses on specific research directions: quantum information theory, quantum simulations, quantum computing, quantum communication, quantum metrology and sensing, quantum matter, and interdisciplinary explorative directions.

Target Group: Bachelor students enrolled in an undergraduate degree in physics, mathematics, computer science, electrical engineering, material science, or chemistry.

Future prospects: The program will continue in 2026.

Munich University Summer Training in German and European Law (MUST) since 2001



LMU Munich, Faculty of Law

MUST started in 2001 as an initiative of LMU's Faculty of Law. Since its beginning, it has included visits to relevant institutions, like the European Patent Office, the Federal Constitutional Court and the Federal Supreme Court of Justice in Karlsruhe. The program was initiated by Prof. Dr. Dagmar Coester-Waltjen and is now under the guidance of Prof. Dr. Thomas Ackermann.

Topics and objectives: The course provides an in-depth introduction to German and European Law. Special attention is devoted to areas that are of interest to foreign lawyers working in business law, i.e. corporate and competition law as well as business taxation. The program brings together exceptional lawyers and law students from many countries and provides the opportunity to create an international alumni network.

Target group and application: Any young lawyer or law student who has done at least one year of study at university level can apply for the program. Participants are selected on the basis of their qualifications and academic or practical experiences.

Certificates: At the end of the program participants have the opportunity to take an examination; successful participation in the examination is documented by a transcript with credits and grades issued by the Faculty of Law of LMU Munich. In addition, a Certificate of Attendance is given to all students.

To help participants get in touch more closely with the social environment and the subject matter a free and optional German language course was offered with 2 levels (absolute beginners, advanced beginners) with a workload of 7 x 2 hours in total.

Future prospects: The program has meanwhile become very well-established and has been integrated into the faculty. It will continue in 2026.

The 14th MACIL Summer School 2024 programme was titled „International Law in an Era of Uncertainty: Challenges, Prospects, and Options“. The course explored pressing challenges to international peace and security. Topics included, inter alia, the evolving role of the United Nations in maintaining global security, recent legal developments concerning the crime of genocide, and whether international humanitarian law is equipped to address new military technologies.

The MACIL summer school is partner of the Erasmus Mundus Master in International Law of Global Security, Peace and Development (ILGSPD), a 24 months Master's program which aims to train the next-generation of lawyers and policy-makers with the ability to navigate the political context of international law and the comprehensive knowledge needed to engage with the issues of global security, peace and development. Machine Learning and Data Analytics in Finance and Accounting (MDA) since 2019

LMU Munich, School of Management



An increasingly complex global business environment requires firms to make use of the large amounts of data out there in order to make better decisions. Machine learning allows to “automatically detect patterns in data, and then use the uncovered patterns to predict future data” (K. Murphy, Research Scientist at Google).

Using data analytics techniques, large data and detected patterns can be visualized and communicated to decision makers. Both rapidly evolve and change businesses as well as companies’ financial processes. This opens up the possibility of using machine learning approaches to cope with complicated real-world financial problems that are too complex for humans.

As a result of participating in this course, a student is expected to

- understand the goals and capabilities of machine learning
- apply machine learning approaches using Python to real-world financial problems
- use important data analytics methods in Python to evaluate large data sets

This program is offered for Bachelor graduates, Masters graduates and young scientists as well as to support their successful placement in attractive fields of activity.

Prerequisites for participation are a good command of written and spoken English. Lectures, presentations and examinations are held in English. Knowledge of German is not a prerequisite.

Big Data Analytics and Business Intelligence (EBI) since 2023

LMU Munich, School of Management



The Munich School of Management at LMU – one of the leading universities for Business Administration and Business Intelligence in Europe – offers a unique summer program for students from around the world. The course “Big Data Analytics and Business Intelligence” takes place online and in the heart of Munich. Big Data Analytics and Business Intelligence refer to a variety of methods and techniques for the analysis of large amounts of business data such as (pre-) processing and extracting information from large datasets, modeling underlying patterns by means of powerful data models as well as reporting and visualization of corporate information.

From the perspective of a business analyst, students apply these data analytics methods to key business topics such as sales analysis, product portfolio analysis, derivation of key cost drivers as well as profitability analysis. Using Microsoft Power BI they learn to describe, model and explore data and creating dashboards to improve economic decision-making in the today's corporate environment.

In this course, participants learn conceptual foundations of Big Data Analytics and Business Intelligence as well as the practical application using Microsoft PowerBI. Big Data Analytics and Business Intelligence concepts are applied to business topics such as product market analysis, sustainable earnings, cost of capital and investment analysis. Students develop data models using PowerBI in order to derive key insights in the company's processes. Powerful visualization tools and scenario analysis allow a better understanding of key performance drivers of the underlying business model.

The program is open to Bachelor and Master students from all faculties and young professionals with an interest in big data analytics, corporate analysis, and business intelligence.

Summer German Language Course since 1998

This four-week language course has been offered by the International Office of LMU Munich in close cooperation with the IUCM since 1998 and has been part of MISU^{LMU} since its beginning. The first German course ever at LMU was offered in 1927. There were no courses between 1938 and 1997.

Topics and objectives: Participants aim is to develop four basic skills: speaking, reading, writing, and listening. Special focus is laid on communication, in particular in the areas of culture and academic study. The classes also explore and examine social contexts with a look at everyday life and culture in Munich, and are supplemented by a variety of activities - such as excursions to points of local cultural significance. Trained language teachers, as well as student tutors, are prepared to help the participants along during the program's various events. Since 2012 additional phonetics tutorials and theater workshops have been provided.

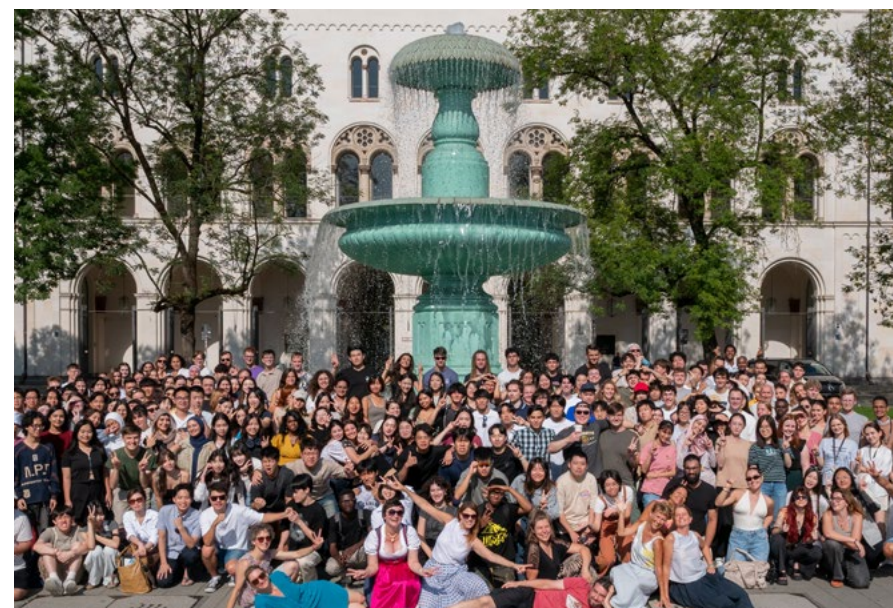

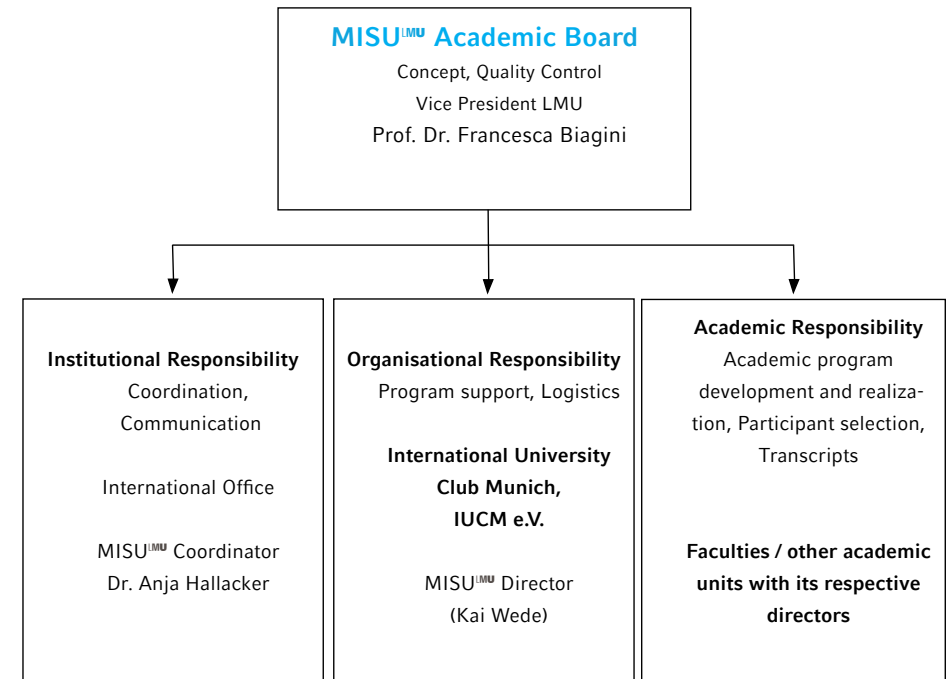

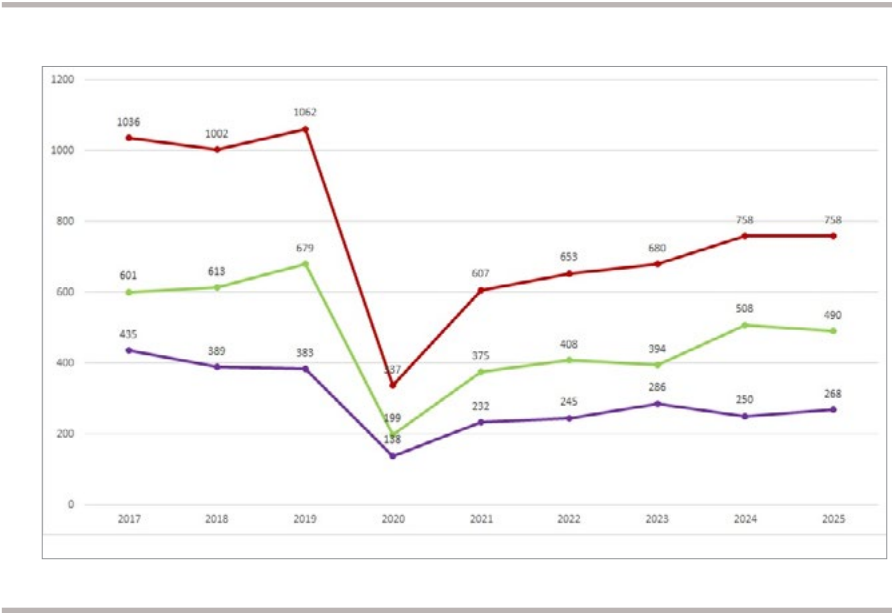

Every year, more than 750 students from no less than 80 countries make MISU a truly international experience.
