OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS

Official transcripts issued by International Affairs of the LMU Munich carry the date of issue, a signature, and the seal of the university on every page.

SEMESTERS

Winter Term (Wintersemester / WiSe) from October to March (classes usually from mid-October to mid-February), Summer Term (Sommersemester / SoSe) from April to September (classes usually from mid-April to mid-July).

LEVELS OF STUDY

Basic Studies (BS, Grundstudium) Introductory and preparatory courses, exercises, practicals, seminars, etc.

Advanced Studies (AS, Hauptstudium)

Admission usually depends on demonstration of successful completion of a period of basic studies (Grundstudium).

EXAMINATION SYSTEM

Professional Examinations (such as law, medicine, teaching)
State examinations (Staatsexamen); may be administered in stages (First, Second, possibly Third State Examination); written and/or oral, taken at stages throughout studies.

Academic Examinations

Intermediate Examination (Vordiplom, Zwischenprüfung); taken at conclusion of period of basic preparatory studies in major subject (occasionally also in minor subjects); written and/or oral.

Final (degree) Examination (Bachelor, Diplom, Magister, Master, Staatsexamen, Promotion); taken at the end of studies; written and/or oral.

TYPES OF COURSES

Lecture (Vorlesung)

Attendance usually not controlled. Active student participation not required. Compulsory lectures are usually followed by a written examination.

Basic Course (Grundkurs) / Basic Seminar (Proseminar) Introductory course. May be divided into lectures and exercises, which are indicated separately.

Exercise/Section (Übung)

May accompany lecture work or denote a special course type on the level of a Basic Course.

Practical (Praktikum)

Field work and/or practical training (may be recorded on collective certificate).

Advanced Seminar (Hauptseminar)

Emphasizes independent academic work, taken after the intermediate examination.

Advanced Seminar for Degree Candidates (Oberseminar) Taken in preparation for thesis work and final examination.

Examination Review Course (Repetitorium)

For law students, intensive examination preparation course.

Colloquium (Kolloquium)

Discussion course.

Tutorial (Tutorium)

Course intensification or examination review course.

Excursion (Exkursion)

Field trip.

Not graded. No course certificate was awarded, either as department policy (for example lecture courses) or because the student has chosen to audit the course.

PNG

Passed, no grade. An ungraded course certificate was awarded or the results were recorded on an examination certificate. The course certificate may be marked "passed" (bestanden), "passed successfully" (teilgenommen mit Erfolg) or "attended regularly" (regelmäßig teilgenommen). On occasion the course is a prerequisite for another course and is accepted as passed if admission to the following course is certified.
